

Overview

KillerKeys VR is an on-screen, virtual keyboard that allows you to learn all the keyboard shortcuts for your favorite applications. The virtual keyboard is interactive and customizable, allowing for mouse or keyboard input to augment what's being displayed.

The interface



1. Application Selection

This drop-down menu shows you the application shortcuts that are available to you and allows you to switch between them.

2. Purchase Application Shortcuts

Click the shopping cart icon to browse and purchase additional application shortcuts.

3. Select QWERTY or AZERTY Keyboard Layout

Click this button to switch the keyboard layout from a QWERTY layout to the AZERTY layout.

4. Opacity Slider

Click and drag this slider to adjust the opacity of the background of the keyboard.

5. Show/Hide Keyboard Setting

This button allows you to change the default keyboard shortcut to hide and show the keyboard. The default shortcut is Control + Spacebar.

6. On-Top Toggle

This button toggles the keyboard so that it will remain on top of any active application (so you can continue to refer to it while working in another application) or will behave like other applications, so that whatever application is active will appear on top of KillerKeys VR.

7. Search

To search for a shortcut, type what you are looking for and a list of matches will appear with the shortcut keys assigned to that shortcut. If you click on one of the results, the keyboard will dim and the shortcut (with a modifier key if necessary) will be highlighted for a few seconds.

8. Expand/Contract Keyboard

Click the Expand/Contract button to change between a standard keyboard layout and an extended (arrow keys and number pad) layout.


9. Modifier Lock

You can lock down a modifier key, such as the Control or Command key. This can be useful for applications such as Microsoft Word that have few direct keystrokes but many Control or Command keystrokes.



10. Multi-Shortcut Ability

Many applications assign more than one shortcut to the same key (or key combination),



so the meaning of the shortcut changes based upon which mode of the application you are in. For example, in Premiere Pro, the "O" key has both "Mark Out" and "Rotate" assigned to it. Keys that have multiple shortcuts assigned have a dotted separation bar (rather than solid). To switch the name on the key to what you use most, simply press and hold the key and a selector window will appear.

Additional Features

Hover Text

Some shortcuts have longer descriptions that can be useful. Simply hover over the shortcut key that you'd like to get more information on and a pop up will appear with an extended description (if one is available).



Resize Keyboard

Whether in the extended or standard keyboard layout, you always have the option to modify the overall size of the keyboard (which will also modify the individual key sizes, allowing more or less room for shortcut text). To make your keyboard layout bigger or smaller, simply drag your mouse to the bottom right corner of the keyboard, then click and move to change the size, which updates in real time. Once you are satisfied with the size, simply release your mouse button.

Interactive With Your Keyboard

While you can use your mouse to click on various modifier keys on KillerKeys VR and show shortcuts when those modifiers are pressed, you can also press a modifier or combination of modifier keys on your keyboard and KillerKeys VR will display the shortcuts accordingly.
